MTG Girls Shine in KCPE Examination Again!!!

Congratulation to all candidates who made MTG proud for excelling in their Kenya Certificate of Primary Education (KCPE) in 2015. The results having been released, a total of 168 candidates from MTG scored above 250 marks with 96 scoring above 300 marks. The 2015 results showed a great improvement in performance compared to the previous year where only 69 MTG girls scored above 250. The girls who scored above 350 marks have been supported by MTG staff to apply for scholarship opportunities and fifteen of them were lucky to get sponsorship for their secondary education. MTG would like to appreciate Palm House Foundation, Equity Bank, Mpesa foundation, Aiducation International, Kenya Commercial bank, Jomo Kenyatta Foundation and Kesho Organization for considering MTG girls for secondary education scholarship. MTG Leagues 2016

The league matches kicked off on Saturday March, 17 2016 after team formation in the league fields. All registered players are encouraged to participate actively in the league to get opportunity to vote for their leaders, be selected for leadership positions, MTG united selections, trainings, trips or win an award.

The 2016 Age categories

Open Age: Born on or before 2002

Under 13: Born between 2003 and 2005

Under 10: Born on or after 2006

MTG League Code of Conduct and Child Protection for Teams/Players 2016

- * I will promote fair play and discourage unsupportive behaviour.
- * I will respect the rules and not fill players who are not members of my team.
- * I will act as a good role model for others
- * I will respect the rules, the officials, the fans and fellow players and other team players.
- * I will not use alcohol or other illegal substances during the MTG Leagues.
- * I will promote and build healthy leader/player relationships that are based on respect and are not abusive
- *I will make sure my own behaviour is calm and respectful and I will be clear about the standards of behaviour *I expect from other players who include children and young people.
- * If there is anger and disagreements between players, as a leader, I will call a time out and try to resolve the issues calmly
- * I will not ignore any player/child or refuse to allow them access to basic necessities
- * I will not try to punish any player/child by mocking, teasing, or laughing at them or trying to embarrass them in front of others
- * I will not behave sexually towards a player/child or touch them in a sexual way
- * I will not hit or strike any player/child as a punishment for bad behaviour
- * I know where to get help to treat sports injuries safely, to minimise further harm or infection
- * I will do everything I can to make sure that the physical environment where the players/children in my care are playing, is as safe and appropriate as possible
- * I am aware that MTG has a Child Protection Policy that relates to this Code of Conduct and that it applies to me.

Award Scheme Winners

The list of 2015 award winners is out. 683 players actively participated in their league activities and filled in the award scheme but only 54 players qualified for the awards. Bamba division recorded 25 players all from Mirihini league field, Ganze division had 8 players, 19 from Bahari division, Kwale and Vitengeni divisions had one player each with no player from Kaloleni division. The disbursement of awards is still going on. The winners who are still going to school are awarded with school levies, uniforms, bags and text books while the out of school girls are supported to start and improve their businesses. Those who have not submitted their budgets are urged to do so through their divisional coordinators. The criteria that has been used to select the winners are:

- * The girl must have been registered in 2015 MTG league
- *The girl must have played more than 6 league matches
- *The girl must have participated in more than 6 coaching sessions
- *The girl must have participated in more than 6 peer education sessions

Congratulations to all winners. All players are encouraged to participate in the league activities and continue to fill in the award scheme for this year!




Name: Neema Balozi

I am Neema Balozi from Matsangoni league field. I joined Moving The Goalposts in 2012 through my friends. I was trained as a peer

educator and a youth peer provider. These trainings helped me to know about my reproductive health and rights. I used to be shy because I dropped out of school because I got pregnant. Then, community members did not want to see me with their daughters because they believed that I would influence them negatively. I felt so discouraged and lonely. Moving The Goalposts gave me hope and assured me that all was not lost. I gained courage and started facilitating as a peer educator in my league field and in several schools. I felt so happy to stand before students to facilitate peer education during video show programs organized by moving The Goalposts. The sessions I conducted enhanced my thinking capacity, made me to be knowledgeable and improved my communication skills. As a youth peer provider, I do counselling sessions with MTG girls and community members. I also distribute contraceptive such male and female condoms and pills. Most of the clients trust me. They feel free to share their problems with me and ask me for advice. The community members who earlier felt that I would influence their children negatively regard me as a role model. They ask me to talk to their daughters and help them register at Moving The Goalposts so that they can benefit the way I have benefited. The MTG volunteer allowances that I received for the contraceptive distribution and peer education sessions in schools have helped me to sustain myself, take care of my son and assist my siblings to continue with their education. I started a soap making and a paraffin business in 2015. I'm now also able to buy food and other basic needs for my parents. I thought my life had ended when I got pregnant at a young age but MTG opened my eyes and gave me hope.

Time to say Goodbye



In 2005, I joined MTG and started coaching the MTG United teams and the coaches. You can imagine how proud I am, now I'm leaving, that one of the MTG United players, M bey u Esse Akida, joined the Harambee Starlets and that three of 'my' coaches, primary

school girls then, are now my colleagues in MTG. I have seen MTG growing from 3 to 46 league fields and from 5 to 26 staff members. MTG has won awards and is recognized locally and internationally. I'm proud of MTG and I'm so happy that I have been part of this unique organization.

want to thank you all for the fantastic time that I have had in MTG, in Kilifi, in Kenya. I enjoyed every minute and I have learned so much from all of you, players, volunteers, staff members and your communities. In the past few years I have asked many of you what your 'most significant change' has been since joining MTG. My most significant change is that I have discovered skills and strengths that I didn't know I had. From a football coach I became a professional in Monitoring and Evaluation and from a resident from the Netherlands I have become a multicultural, global citizen. I want to thank you all for sharing your time, stories, football practices and experiences with me. I wish you all the best and would like to encourage you all to participate in MTG activities as much as you can. The longer you are in MTG, the more chances you give yourself to discover your strengths and learn skills that will help you to become the person that you want to be.
